UHON3090 – Honors Enrichment Seminar/ WRIT 3030H - Selected Topics in Writing: Narrative, Memory, and Identity in Post-Communist Albania

Course Description:

It is widely recognized that the half century of cold-war isolation under often brutal communist regimes constitutes an unresolved traumatic past for the transitional societies of the former Soviet Bloc. As the trials of transition have made clear, histories of repressive surveillance, detention, torture, and execution under dictatorship remain pervasively present, not simply in individuals' memories and identities, but in the structures and institutions through which democracy must evolve. The problem of how to confront and re-work these pasts is central to developing democratic societies. Post-conflict and transition societies have employed a diverse range of testimonial strategies that attempt to rework the past in ways that are enabling. These include public exhibitions and museum installations, the commissioning of memorials, fact-finding missions and historians' tribunals, the establishment of truth and reconciliation commissions and international criminal tribunals, and official apologies. In *Narrative, Memory, and Identity*, American students will learn about this cold war history by studying the testimonial projects that attempt to work through the traumatic legacy of this history.

Based in Albania and affiliated with European University of Tirana and the United Nations Development Project Brain-Gain Albania, students will work closely with professionals in international development and civil society as well as with university students to explore the legacy of traumatic experience under authoritarian regimes. As ethnic Albanian identity has played an important role in conflicts in Kosovo and Macedonia and is a factor in Greco-Balkan relations, we will be traveling to neighboring countries to study the competing historical narratives of identity and nation mobilizing conflict, linguistic territories/ communities and regional contests over genealogy, the cultural master narratives constructing nationalist identities, and unresolved contests over how to remember and interpret the past underlying the ethnic and territorial wars of the 1990s in the Balkans region. We will pay special attention to the interplay between individual and collective identity and how these are factors in border formation and security, trafficking, and border-crossings.

The objectives of this course are for you: 1) to identify the key points of the literature on narrative, memory, and identity; 2) apply your knowledge of the literature to an analysis of

historical sites, memorialization projects, and daily interaction with our Albanian cohorts; 3) to apply overall concepts to a contemporary issue on which you conduct independent research.

Research Paper – 18-20 page paper (joint with POLS 3335) - 40% Journal – 20% Final exam – 20% Attendance and Participation – 20%

Research paper: The research paper will be 18-20 pages in length, plus works cited. The purpose of the paper is for you to research one of these topics: Balkan wars and conflict, post-communism, territory and identity, ethnic conflict, linguistic territory, traumatic memory and identity, collective memory and narratives of national identity. The paper must refer to components from both POLS 3335 AND WRIT 3030. Papers are due by the end of Summer Term A, on **June 18**. The paper will not receive a full grade if it is late, except under unusual circumstances for which the instructor provides permission. Papers that are late will receive 5 points off the grade for each day late (including weekend days).

Objective of research paper: to strengthen your research skills, learn to use a theory to explain an actual international territorial dispute or the memory and identity issues at stake in unresolved conflict situations; understand specific characteristics of the traumatic impact of conflict on populations, analyze data, case studies, and/or relevant information to test the validity of your theory, and improve your academic writing skills.

Objective of attendance and participation: to learn from discussions of readings, to engage in significant discussions, guest lectures, service experience, cultural experiences, and overall travel abroad.
